

Identify & Solve

Identify:

Droppings are typically the easiest way to identify a rat problem. Mouse droppings are smaller, like black grains of rice.

You may also see rats, hear rat squeaking as well as hissing and chattering, or find chewed-up material. Outside, there may be burrows or runways.

How to Get Rid of Rodents

1. Remove sources of food and shelter.
2. Prevent access to your home.
3. Remove excess debris from your yard.
4. Keep compost enclosed in a bin with a tight-fitting lid.
5. Contain chicken and animal food in rat-proof containers.
6. Sweep and contain or dispose of uneaten feed after meals.
7. Eliminate rodents through trapping or professional help.

Warning: Use of poison is not recommended and should be regarded as a last resort tactic.

Poison can harm or kill humans, pets, birds, and other animals, as well as our environment.

Cleaning Up After Rodents

Always take precautions to protect yourself from the potential of infectious disease. Wear gloves, clean surfaces with disinfectant, and follow all labeled instructions.

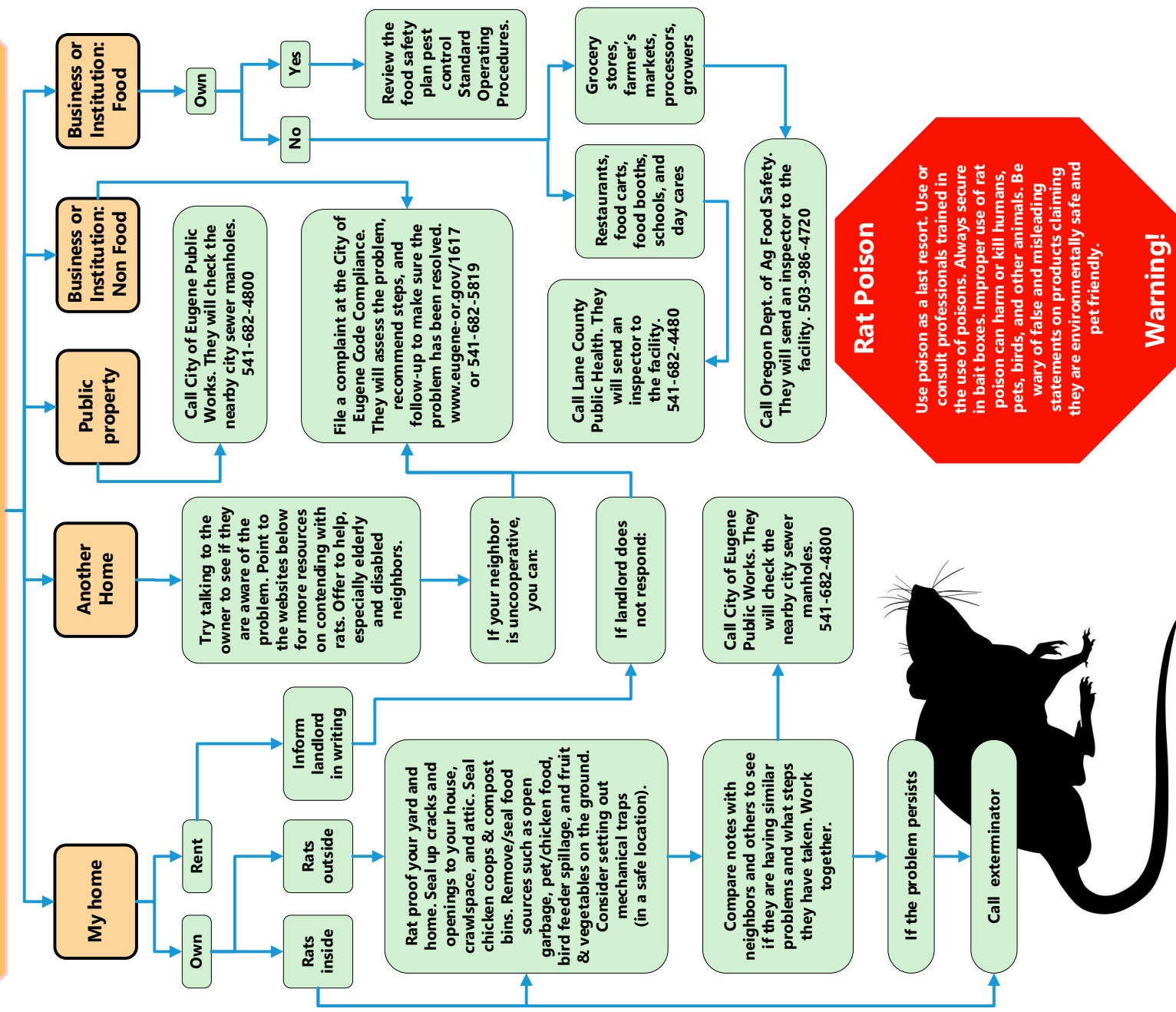
- Public health risk

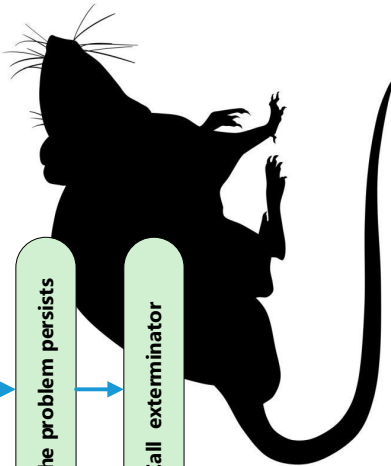

Rat Poison

Use poison as a last resort. Use or consult professionals trained in the use of poisons. Always secure in bait boxes. Improper use of rat poison can harm or kill humans, pets, birds, and other animals. Be wary of false and misleading statements on products claiming they are environmentally safe and pet friendly.
